Course description

This course focuses on diagnostic reasoning in nephropathology, moving beyond pattern recognition towards interpretation in clinical context. Through a combination of concise lectures and extensive case-based sessions, participants will explore how morphology, immunopathology, ultrastructure and clinical data integrate into real-life diagnostic decisions. Emphasis is placed on common pitfalls, overlapping patterns and mechanism-based understanding of kidney injury.

The course is designed as a case-driven, interactive experience focusing on interpretation.

Learning objectives

After completing this course, participants will be able to:

- interpret kidney biopsy findings in clinical context
- recognise diagnostic pitfalls in pattern-based assessment
- differentiate primary vs secondary mechanisms of injury
- integrate immunofluorescence and electron microscopy findings into diagnosis
- approach complex cases involving deposits and monoclonality

Target Audience:

The course is designed for pathologists who are at the start of Nephropathology training.

Registration is open to residents too.

Clinical colleagues in Nephrology are also welcome to register, in case they wish to expand their skills.

Bring your case:

Course participants are welcome to submit cases related to the subject of the course to be discussed during the slide seminar sessions. The cases will be distributed by the Faculty to the several “Participant Cases” sessions.

The objective is two-fold: Participants are welcome to share own difficult cases as a form of informal consultation, or to present already diagnosed cases with an international audience. All cases must be submitted in advance of the course. The Faculty encourages participants interested in presenting a case to submit it as early possible, allowing time for review and distribution within the course programme.
